Vaccines – which protect against disease by assuring immunity – are widely and routinely given around the world. This practice is based on the idea that it is better to keep people from falling ill than to focus only on helping them recover once they are ill. Suffering, disability and death are avoided. Immunisation is thought to prevent twenty to thirty lakh childhood deaths every year. In addition, infection is reduced, strain on healthcare systems is eased, and money is frequently saved that can be used for other health services. Immunisation is a proven tool for controlling and even eradicating disease. An immunisation campaign carried out by the World Health Organisation (WHO) from 1967 to 1977 eradicated the natural occurrence of smallpox. When the programme began, the disease still threatened 60 % of the world's population and killed every fourth victim. Eradication of polio is within reach. Since the launch of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988, infections have fallen by 99 %. Between 2000 and 2008, measles deaths dropped worldwide by almost 78%, and some regions have resolved to eliminate the disease. Science, used in a constructive way, definitely benefits humanity.
